



This is the 2013 LEAP class boundless playground at Roger Scott which was built in an urban park in Pensacola, Florida. The playground has never been “usable” by kids who use wheelchairs because it was not connected to an accessible path of travel and the ramp is three inches off the ground.



A taunting picture was sent to me on 9-23-2022 by the Mayor of Pensacola of him standing on top of a mountain at a National Park bragging that he has the physical ability to go where some can't go. In his email, he explains to me in all of his wisdom and legal knowledge that he is in a federal park (wilderness) that is not required to be accessible to people with disabilities. He proclaims that not every place can be made accessible for people with disabilities. That is certainly true and the ADA does not require a wheelchair lift to be erected to the top of a mountain. Pensacola's Mayor Robinson doesn't know the difference between a boundless playground for disabled children built in an urban area that is not accessible but could be, and a remote wilderness in a National Park. They say a picture is worth a thousand words.
