

OVERVIEW OF PROGRESS of the 200th ANNIVERSARY COMMISSION to COMMEMORATE FLORIDA JOINING the UNITED STATES

On July 17, 1821, American and Spanish officials oversaw the exchange of flags in Pensacola as Florida formally passed from Spanish to American possession. People in attendance that day reflected Pensacola's diverse population. Today, we see that the diversity of the 1821 population is still reflected in our modern community. At the request of Pensacola Mayor Grover Robinson and the Escambia County Board of County Commissioners, the 200th Anniversary Commission has been developing ways in which our community can commemorate this important event in our local, state, and national history.

The onset of the Covid-19 pandemic impacted the planning to a great degree. However, in this unprecedented time, we have developed a plan to bring our community together to celebrate this important event with products and events designed to engage our community both via remote participation and, this summer, hopefully in person.

Several examples of products coming out of the 200th Anniversary planning are:

A database of information on all individuals who can be identified as being in Pensacola in 1821. This project is sponsored by the West Florida Genealogy Society and will be accessible to the public via a virtual platform. It is an especially exciting project as the product, 1821: A Pensacola Sampler, will reflect the presence of the overall population along with the military members who were here.

An interactive mosaic of faces from our modern community "standing for" people who were here in 1821.

A virtual walking tour of historic St. Michael's Cemetery focused on the people who were in Pensacola in 1821 and are buried there. St. Michael's Cemetery Foundation, Inc. is partnering with the UWF Archaeology Institute and the UWF Historic Trust to create this virtual tour. This product will be available to the public via a virtual platform.

In the planning stage, a documentary on the historic event, the people of Pensacola ca 1821, and the 200th Anniversary will be a statewide offering by public broadcasting. This is a partnership between WSRE. WUWF, and Florida Humanities (funding source).

Historic markers highlighting the anniversary and the people and places of 1821.

A formal commemoration program will take place in Museum Plaza (Historic Pensacola Village) on Saturday morning, July 17, 2021, exactly 200 years after the exchange of Spanish and American flags. A historic marker will be unveiled. Following the formal program with a re-creation of the exchange of flags, Historic Pensacola Village will be open to the public at no charge. A number of programs and performances will take place throughout the Village.

Programing is structured to reflect our community's rich and diverse heritage and the collective influences that makes our community what it is today.

This commemoration is an excellent opportunity to reach a broad audience, not only in Pensacola and Escambia County, but also across the state, region, nation, and beyond. The pandemic will end, and people will be ready to take full advantage of all we have to offer. Our community is looking for something uplifting in this time of uncertainty. Let's lift our community up.
